Dr Advocate Linda Mbana brings a wealth of experience and a very impressive CV. Her qualifications include a Bachelor of Law, LLB, LLM in Labour Law and a Doctorate in Policing. She recently received a Postgraduate Certificate in Dispute Resolution Management. She started her career as a Judges Researcher at the Land Claims Court, and then worked in different departments as a Legal Advisor at different levels. Dr Adv Mbana was also a Deputy CEO at the Private Security Industry Regulatory Authority (PSIRA) responsible for Law Enforcement. She was a Major General at the South African Police Service (SAPS) responsible for Legal Services, and later was the Head of the Hawks in the North West. Currently, she is an executive responsible for Regulatory Services at the Cross Border Road Transport Agency (C-BRTA) and a part-time Commissioner of the Defence Force Service Commission. She is also an Advocate of the High Court and an Ombudsperson at the University of South Africa.
